Palm Sunday - April 13, 11:00 am

Holy Week begins with Palm Sunday. Our morning worship will center on the theme of Jesus's entry into Jerusalem, which leads to the passion story of the Christ.

Maundy Thursday – April 17, 6:00 pm

Our journey through Holy Week continues with Maundy Thursday. This moving service centers on the Last Supper of Jesus and his disciples. As they did on that evening, we will share Holy Communion together. Epiphany UCC will join us.

Good Friday – April 18, 6:00 pm

We will join with Epiphany UCC, at Epiphany, for this Good Friday service to remember the day of the Christ's crucifixion.

Easter Sunday - April 20, 11:00 am

The events of Holy Week culminate in the glorious resurrection celebration of Easter Sunday. Our service will include the sharing of Holy Communion.



From Ash Wednesday to Good Friday, we are encouraged to reflect upon our whole lives. Affirmed in our humanity, we are reminded that from dust and love we come and to dust and love we will return. Our lives are fleeting, as reflected in the question that I hear most often as people tell me their life stories "where has the time gone?"

As a former chaplain in Hospice, one of the spiritual interventions used often was life review. As an invitation for the patients to review their lives, life review was an opportunity to remember – the highs and the lows, the good and the bad, and the ups and the downs moments – and reflect upon what legacy or last words the patients had for their loved ones.

On Good Friday, we will be invited to reflect upon the last words of Jesus – his legacy, his lessons, and his love for others. Just like us, Jesus had a legacy he wanted to leave and last words for our spiritual ancestors and for us:

Forgive them, for they do not know what they do. Today you will be with me in paradise. Woman, behold your son!
My God, my God, why have you forsaken me? I thirst.
It is finished!
Into your hands I commit my spirit!

Church, what legacy or last words do you want to leave for your loved ones and your church? Living in the shadow of Good Friday, we are invited to spend some time thinking about what we would want our last words to be to our loved ones too. What lessons might you want to make sure your loved ones knew before you made the transition from this life into life everlasting? What last words would you want your loved ones to hear spoken aloud to them? What legacy do you want to leave behind of a life well lived?

Let us live out our legacy today. Whenever we find ourselves wondering "where has the time gone" it is an opportunity to remember the moments and milestones of our lives and reflect on what we want to leave behind as our legacy. Let us leave behind a legacy like Jesus today, tomorrow, and all the days to come. Thanks be to God. Amen.

I found Church. And it was not in a church building. It was at a Community Action Meeting where people gathered in a small storefront to discuss what to do in response to the unethical and inhumane legislation of the current administration. This was Church – people whose love for others compelled them to take action in the face of violence, injustice, and oppression.

Looking around at all gathered, I saw a mosaic and microcosm of the community around us. Present at this meeting were parents, grandparents, caregivers, teachers, politicians, veterans, nurses, union representatives, small business owners, engineers, electricians, social workers, religious leaders, and community activists. This group was made up of people from all political sides — Republicans, Democrats, Independents, and more. Some were employed, some were retired, and some were fired due to the recent slate of cuts mandated by the federal government.

What might draw people – from all different walks of life, all different ages and abilities, all different races and ethnicities, all different sexual orientations and gender identities, all different socioeconomic statuses, all different faith backgrounds, all different professions, all different political positions, and all different backgrounds – together? It is OUR WHY. What drew us all together was OUR WHY, all the reasons that led us to come together.

Invited to share **OUR WHY** with one another, each person present had an opportunity to speak. Overcome by emotion, each person present shared their reasons for coming to the meeting:

our children, our loved ones, our neighbors, and the most vulnerable among us;

to take back our democracy, not allow what has happened to become the norm, to uphold the Constitution;

to be part of the movement, simply cannot sit idly by anymore, to make the world a better place, to walk in the ways of Jesus.

It was OUR WHYs that drew us all together at the Community Action Meeting. As an alternative representation of the church, we knew OUR WHY for the work we were to do together at the Community Action Meeting. But as a Church (Lockport UCC), do we know OUR WHY? Why has God drawn us together? Why do we do what we do as a church? Why does God have us in this place at this time?

Church – what is OUR WHY? It is what motivates all that we do together. It is what we are called to do together. It is what draws us together in mission and ministry. If we are to do effective ministry in our communities, we must know our why. It is the lens through which we make decisions, through which we determine ministry objectives, through which we allocate and distribute resources. It is the lens through which we do everything!

What is OUR WHY? Let us share OUR WHY with one another today, tomorrow, and all the days to come!




We will have some slips on the entrance table for you to do just that. On the slip, you can write the name of a song from worship that day to let us know:

ENVIRONMENTAL JUSTICE MINISTRIES

From the birth of the environmental justice movement in the 1980s to the local ministries of churches throughout the country today, the United Church of Christ has been making a profound difference in caring for God's creation through the Creation Justice Church program, Earth Day resources, the Pollinator newsletter, Creation Justice Webinars, and the work of the UCC Council for Climate Justice.

Did You Know . . .

UCC ministers coined the phrase "environmental racism" and played a leading role in giving birth to the environmental justice movement in the 1980s. During a six week campaign of civil disobedience in 1982, a movement was born that made national headlines and introduced the world to the issue of environmental racism.

Did You Know . . .

The UCC has published groundbreaking environmental justice reports. In 1987, the UCC's Commission for Racial Justice published the first report to comprehensively demonstrate environmental racism across the nation with its report Toxic Wastes and Race in the United States. A 20th anniversary report took that research further in demonstrating that when facilities were clustered together in an area the likelihood of racial and economic disparities increased. In 2020, a report entitled "Breath to the People: Sacred Air and Toxic Pollution" added another dimension of research by focusing on the children who live near polluting facilities and are particularly vulnerable to toxic emissions.

Did You Know . . .

The UCC has often led the way in taking denominational stands on major environmental issues. In 2013, the UCC was the first denomination to pass a resolution calling for divestment from fossil fuel companies. In 2019, the UCC was the first Christian denomination to endorse the Green New Deal. In 2021, the UCC became the first mainline Protestant denomination to publicly affirm and proclaim that nature has rights.

Did You Know . . .

The UCC is building a powerful environmental network that stays connected through a blog and e-newsletter called The Pollinator. The Pollinator is a digital platform of the UCC for the sharing of ideas and inspiration, so that we might become more fruitful in the pursuit of environmental justice. Its focus is the building of a faith-filled and faith-rooted movement for the care of creation.

Did You Know . . .

UCC churches are deepening and expanding their commitment to the environment by becoming Creation Justice Churches. Whether it is taking on climate change or addressing the lead poisoning of children, environmental justice ministries could not have a higher purpose or calling than they do now. Congregations can join the movement and become a Creation Justice Church.

This Womxn's History Month: Christians Unite for Reproductive Rights! Output Church Of Christ

In 1973, the United States Supreme Court ruled that a pregnant person's right to an abortion is protected under the Constitution. For nearly 50 years, women had the choice to make decisions about their own bodies. But the reversal of this landmark decision in 2022 has paved the way for dangerous attacks on reproductive freedom.

States that ban and criminalize abortion have higher rates of maternal and infant deaths and increased economic insecurity. Pregnancy-related deaths are rising as doctors are afraid of having their license to practice revoked and being jailed for saving lives. For example, in Texas, where abortion is entirely banned and criminalized, rates of sepsis – a life-threatening condition – have risen by more than 50% for lost pregnancies that occurred in the second trimester. Historically economically marginalized populations including Black communities, people of color, and low-income communities have particularly diminished access to reproductive healthcare, placing them in greater harm.

And reproductive access continues to be under attack, including by President Trump. The Hyde Amendment, which first went into effect in 1977, was recently re-instated by President Trump as an executive order. It prohibits the use of federal funds for abortions except in cases of rape, incest, or the pregnant person's life being in danger. However, even when an abortion is deemed medically necessary to save a person's life, this amendment has failed to protect pregnant people.

This patchwork of state and administrative attacks on reproductive freedoms has now morphed into a mosaic of partisan initiatives spanning access to contraceptives, emergency medical care, and even in vitro fertilization, raising broader questions about women's bodily autonomy in 2025. The movement in favor of abortion bans has fundamentally broadened its scope and threatens all people's human rights.

The Women's Health Protection Act would safeguard access to abortion and the full range of reproductive healthcare. This includes protections from political or religious interference and protections from state and federal legislation that impose medically unnecessary regulations on access to abortion services including medication, mandatory waiting periods, or full abortion bans. Urge your members of Congress to re-introduce and pass the Women's Health Protection Act today to stop the rollback of reproductive rights!

If You are Concerned about This or Other Issues, You Can . . .

TAKE ACTION

Contacting your Representative and Senators in Washington CAN make a difference. Send a letter or email, or make a phone call to let them know your feelings on this issue. And don't forget your representatives at the State level. Laws and policies in the States can make a difference, too.
