Getting Comfortable in Our New Church Home

We have been meeting in our new church building for about two months now, and it's starting to feel quite comfortable there. We have been getting things arranged, and making changes and additions as we find what works best for our needs. This process will take a little while, as we decide what to put on our blank walls, etc.

One example is the children's room. We realized that the small office we started with was not really adequate. So, we have moved the kids space to a larger area where they have more room for their furniture and toys, gets nice sunlight to make it brighter, and gives them room to move around and "be kids". We want everyone to feel welcome and comfortable – even our youngest attenders!

We are anxiously awaiting our new signs for the outside of the building, and our new sound system for the worship space. These should be installed soon!

As for the old church building, we are completely moved out, but have not yet closed on the sale. Everything seems to be in place to do so, except we



are waiting for the final approval from the NY State Attorney General. That should be coming through soon, so we expect to be able to close before long.

It's been quite a journey to get to this point, but things are coming together now. We have already discovered that our new location puts us right in the heart of the community. We were able to participate in the Trick or Treat on Main Street event on October 25, which brought about 650+ children and their families to our front door. We have already had some visitors to our Sunday service – perhaps because our new location has generated some notice of our friendly little church?

At this point, there is much to be hopeful about, and our new building space looks as though it may suit us very well as we move into the future for Lockport UCC!



"Without a doubt" Reflection on Ordination Vows

One of the most memorable moments of my ordination service was the vows (promises) made to all of you and to God. In writing the vows myself, it seems important to reflect on the journey of ordination. The **first vow** made to all of you and to God expressed my conviction of my calling into ordained ministry:

Like **Paul the Apostle**, are you convinced without any doubt that God has called you to be an ordained minister of the church of Jesus Christ, and are you ready with the help of God to enter this ministry and to serve faithfully in it?

My response was one of deep conviction and certainty about my calling. My response of affirmation was: without a doubt, I am. There is no doubt in my mind or in my heart or in my soul that God has called me into ordained ministry in the United Church of Christ.

But I was not always as certain as I am about my calling into ministry. As a woman called into ministry, doubts filled my mind as I embarked upon the journey of discernment. Although I knew that there was nothing else that I wanted to do with my life than share all about how God can change our lives, there were many who claimed that a woman could not be called into ordained ministry.

The voices of opposition that were mounted against me caused an existential crisis in my life. I questioned why God would call me into ministry but make me a woman. Facing the biblical and theological arguments against women in ministry led me to know without a doubt that God does call women into ministry. Soon, I discovered that the bible passages used to argue against women in ministry were being misinterpreted and misused to stifle and suppress women!

Amidst the opposition, God opened my eyes to affirmation of my ministerial calling. Over and over again, God sent me persons who witnessed the fruit of my calling into ministry and offered affirmation within my discernment process. Y'all, the proof is in the fruit! This is why it is so important to discern our calling in ministry alongside many others (local churches, mentors, pastors, professors, and the committee on ministry). Endorsement from them throughout the journey empowered and emboldened me to live into the calling that was placed upon my life, long before I ever knew it was possible.

Because of all of this, it is without a doubt that I know God has called me into ordained ministry. Thanks be to God. Amen.

Reverend A Title of Endorsement

What's in a title? Pastor. Reverend. Teacher. Ordination granted me a new title: Reverend. To some people, it's just a title. Nothing more. But to me, it is more than a title. To become Rev. Hope Schwartz means that I have official endorsement by the United Church of Christ.



Endorsement comes only after a long-term vetting process where fitness for ministry and ministerial calling was discerned amongst myself, the local church, and the Committee on Ministry. It may seem insignificant, but to be endorsed by the denomination is an affirmation of my calling into ordained ministry.

You might be surprised to learn that not all churches or denominations support the ordination of women into ministry. It is true, and those churches suffer from the absence of women in ministry. Good news, you cannot go too far without encountering the many women pastors called into service in the UCC.

Even though there are many women in ministry around us, to be ordained requires a "call" to serve in a ministerial setting. This means that ordination comes after the "call" of a person into service. Being called into service as the pastor at Epiphany UCC and Lockport UCC reveals just how important of a role you all had in my special day. Without your voice and vote to call me as your pastor, I could not have been ordained. Of course, there could have been other churches that offered a call to me, but God invited you to be the churches to do it! For this, I am overflowing with gratitude!

Reverend is a new title for me. It is a special title, as it is truly a title of endorsement. But Pastor came first . . . and it is a title that binds us together in covenantal relationship. God has called us into a covenantal relationship through which we all commit to live into our faith together in service to God. Becoming Reverend Hope could not have happened without first becoming Pastor Hope. Ordination only happened because of all of you calling me to serve among you as your pastor.



With a heart overflowing with gratitude, I thank you for calling me to be your pastor. It means is the world to me.

UCC to offer Election Day Prayer Service and Vigil

Here's an example of a Daily Devotional, from October 28, written by Quinn G. Caldwell, Chaplain of the Protestant Cooperative Ministry at Cornell University:

Come to him, a living stone, though rejected by mortals yet chosen and precious in God's sight, and like living stones, let yourselves be built into a spiritual house. – 1 Peter 2:4-5 (NRSV)

Some days I think 90% of the work of the church is helping people right-size themselves in their own estimation.

You are a precious, unique, beloved child of God! Just like the rest of humanity.

God has your name written on the palm of their hand! Right next to everybody else's.

You are made of stardust! So is poop.

Both the former and the latter statements in each of these pairs are true and important, but some of us have heard way more of one than the other from the world, instead of the balanced diet we deserve.

Deciding which message to lean harder on for a given community, or moment, or sermon is the right work of church leaders. It's the work the author of 1 Peter is trying to do with his stones and buildings metaphor. He's had enough of Paul's "the body is made up of many fabulously, amazingly, wonderfully unique parts like you!" metaphor.

You, mined from the same quarry as the capstone of all creation, have a very special place in God's spiritual house: set in a wall 60 feet up where no one will ever see or distinguish you from your peers.

I am a living stone, firm and noble, exactly fulfilling the design of the great Architect of the Universe! Without me, the section of wall in that weird corner in the back next to the mop closet would be significantly weakened.

You truly are wonderful. Truly, so is everyone else.
